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***FEINSTEIN & EDER MAKE THEIR ONLY CT APPEARANCE
HEADLINING CONCERT AT WARNER!***

TORRINGTON, CT— The Warner Theatre, 68 Main Street, will host recording artists **Michael Feinstein** and **Linda Eder** on **April 27th at 8pm** in their **only CT appearance**. The concert, entitled "**Two for the Road: An Evening with Michael Feinstein and Linda Eder,**" features works drawn from the American songbook and marks Eder's return to the Warner Theatre since she headlined the historic art deco theatre's gala reopening in 2002.

Linda Eder made her Broadway debut as Lucy in *Jekyll & Hyde*, garnering a Theatre World Award as well as Drama Desk and Outer Critics Circle nominations for her work. Also a concert and recording artist, her solo CDs include "Linda Eder," "And So Much More," "It's Time," "Gold" and "Broadway My Way." Eder also starred in Frank Wildhorn's *Camille Claudel* at Goodspeed.

A four-time Grammy nominee, Michael Feinstein is often credited with reinvigorating the American popular song. The crooner has performed in concert halls around the world and on Broadway and now co-owns his own nightclub, Feinstein's at the Regency. His numerous solo recordings include "Michael and George: Feinstein Sings Gershwin," "Big City Rhythms" "Romance On Film, Romance On Broadway," "Michael Feinstein with The Israel Philharmonic Orchestra" and "Only One Life: The Songs of Jimmy Webb."

Tickets are \$100, \$64, \$54, \$44. There is an additional \$1.00 per ticket Preservation Fee charged to help maintain the historic Warner Theatre facilities. 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About the Warner

Built by Warner Brothers Studios and opened in 1931 as a movie palace, the Warner Theatre was described then as "Connecticut's Most Beautiful Theatre." Damaged extensively in a flood, the Warner was slated for demolition in the early 1980s until the non-profit Northwest Connecticut Association for the Arts (NCAA) was founded and purchased the theatre. The Warner reopened as a performing arts center in 1983, and restoration of the lobbies and auditorium was completed in November 2002. Today, the Warner is in operation year-round with more than 140 performances and some 92,000 patrons passing through its doors each season. NCAA's

mission is to preserve the Warner Theatre as an historic landmark, enhance its reputation as a center of artistic excellence and a focal point of community involvement, and satisfy the diverse cultural needs of the region.
